Greater Lakes Region Children's Auction and Community Challenge Results for 2023

We are excited to share the record-breaking news for the Community Challenge/Pub Mania and the Greater Lakes Region Children's Auction:

- Community Challenge Teams (including Team Taylor supporters) were responsible for raising \$356,456 an increase of over \$51,000 from last year.

Something to Check Out: The Caregiver Minute

Many of our residents find themselves in the position of caretaker for a loved one here at Taylor Community. Being a caregiver, especially when it involves caring for someone with cognitive deficits, creates enormous demands on any individual in this role. The loved one's memory loss, confusion, trouble with wordfinding, and "sundowning" are just some examples of the challenges caregivers must contend with on a daily basis.

As caregivers support their loved ones, they in turn need support. Here at Taylor Community in Laconia, the Caregivers Support Group, which meets every Tuesday at 11:00 a.m. in the Birch Room at Woodside, is a resource for caregivers. Another useful resource is "The Caregiver Minute," a daily video sent via email to recipients. The Caregiver Minute is presented by Eric Collett, the founder of A Mind For All Seasons, an organization that specializes in brain health. Eric is a nationally renowned expert on dementia, and provides a daily presentation, lasting from three to seven minutes, that addresses a specific aspect of brain health and caring for, or interacting with, an individual with dementia. Members of the Caregivers Support Group have found these daily videos powerfully helpful.

This material should not be recycled in our curbside recycling bins since it currently is not accepted by our recycling contractor.


The Taylor Project Committee has approved providing a receptacle for residents to use to drop off their foam material and arrangements have been made to transport it to a regional foam recycling facility.

It's the most wonderful time of the year for scams!!!

The scammers are out there and unfortunately, are usually a few steps ahead of the honest citizen. We are bombarded with scam telephone calls, e-mails including fishing schemes and dangerous links, and our credit cards and mail are subject to theft and skimming. It is impossible to know who to trust.

Many residents are receiving phone calls from scammers purporting to be from Medicare or Social Security. They will tell you that there has been a "problem" with your Medicare or Social Security number and that they need information to clear up the problems. **HANG UP THE PHONE IMMEDIATELY** if you get this call. It is an attempt by scammers to obtain personal information to be used by them to use your identity or to steal from the Medicare program.

There are several additional phone call scams with the caller telling you there is a problem with something you ordered from Amazon or with your PayPal or Venmo number. The bait is that the Amazon item is valued at a high amount, example \$600, and that they need information to send it to you. This may cause you to think to yourself, "oh boy, free stuff!" When you talk with them, they tell you that you need to pay the postage and need a credit card number to pay a minimal postage amount, and your item will soon be on its way to you. THIS IS A SCAM. YOU DID NOT ORDER ANYTHING FROM AMAZON. They want your credit card number. The PayPal scam is similar, but the objective here is that they either want your bank account number or in some versions, need you to buy gift cards or Bitcoin, to settle the matter — **ANOTHER SCAM**. Some residents have received calls from "Eversource" saying that their bill has not been paid, and their electricity will be shut off unless they pay on the phone. This, too, IS A SCAM.

There are hundreds of permutations of these scams, but if you do not recognize the phone number that is calling, let it go to voicemail.

If they leave a message, listen and decide if it is a valid call.

There are new gift card scams, debit card scams and all the old favorites like the Jamaican Lottery Scam or the Nigerian Prince scam coming back every year, too. But if you do get swept up in a phone call from a smooth-talking huckster, pay close attention to how they want to be paid. If they mention gift cards or Bitcoin, hang up immediately. No legitimate offers or opportunities ever need to be paid in that manner.

Internet scams are varied and even more nefarious. Many will look like they are from your bank, a company you do business with or someone that you trust. The message in the e-mail will outline something too good to be true, or will be alerting you to a problem with your credit card, bank account, or anything that may pique your curiosity. In the body of the e-mail will be a link to which the message tells you to click. **NEVER NEVER NEVER CLICK** A LINK IN AN E-MAIL FROM AN UNKNOWN **SENDER**. If you do, a number of bad things may happen including losing your computer to a scammer and all of the information on it will be stolen and used to steal everything you have, or to take out a loan or credit card in your name, or worse.

Pay attention to the return e-mail address — it may look like a familiar name, but it also may be something that is unfamiliar to you. Look at the spelling and wording in the body of the e-mail; it may be stilted or have grammatical or spelling errors. This is not always the case, but it is a first line of defense to watch for telltale issues.

Wednesday, January 3rd

Time for our monthly Men's Breakfast on Wednesday, January 3rd, 2024 in the Woodside Elm Room, since it is the 1st Wednesday of the month. As usual, coffee will be ready at about 7:15 a.m., with food at about 7:30 a.m., and the speaker from 8:00 - 9:00 a.m.

Our speaker this month will be a resident of Taylor - Marty Hall. He is a cross country skiing pioneer — so instrumental in transforming the sport that he was inducted into the United States Ski and Snowboard Hall of Fame in 2017. He was appointed as the first full-time paid United States Olympic Cross-Country Coach in 1970. When he began professionally working in the industry, women were not included in the sport. In order to open opportunities for women to compete professionally in cross-country skiing, he started the first United States Women's Team in 1969. In order to bring new spectators to the sport, he helped design a new trail system using short loop courses instead of long loop courses so that racers will go by multiple times with the spectators close to the trails and able to watch the action, rather than sitting in the stadium watching only the start and finish of the race. He will show a short film, and will answer questions from the floor.


Isabella Stewart Gardner Museum

The Flying Monkey: Gypsy







Mark T. Small - An American Music Concert

Mark is an internationally recognized musician and entertainer who has performed in numerous venues throughout the United States & Europe. His CD was named BEST Acoustic Blues Album in 2014 and his recordings have reached the top 20 on National Music Charts. Mark is an extraordinarily accomplished guitarist. His concerts include instrumentals and singing and playing music from the early 1800s to the late 1950s. You will hear Mark's signature foot stompin' blues, boogie and honky-tonk selections. 



Bipolar General - My Forever War with Mental Illness

Gregg F. Martin, PhD, Major General, US Army (Retired), served on active duty for 36 years, until May 2015. He is a combat veteran, Bipolar Survivor, Airborne-Ranger-Engineer qualified soldier, and Army Strategist. Maj. Gen. Gregg Martin cut a striking figure in the Army: athletic, quick-witted, devout, and studious, he was a natural leader. Thanks to his engineering and leadership know-how, Martin was chosen to lead the thousands of combat engineers who paved the way for 100,000 Army troops to battle their way to Baghdad in 2003.

Martin was astonishing to watch as he led this effort, his mind laser-focused and body vibrating with energy. He made quick decisions, often anticipating and solving

problems before orders came down. Only years later would he learn how the pressure of organizing dozens of simultaneous life-or-death missions each day altered the biochemistry of his brain. Since adolescence he'd had what psychiatrists call a 'hyperthymic personality' – an exceptionally positive, energetic, and can-do disposition. But the Iraq War triggered what military and Veterans Administration psychiatrists ultimately diagnosed as late-onset bipolar disorder, a chemical imbalance that sends sufferers whipsawing between grandiose imaginings and suicidal depressions. His increasingly erratic behavior led to his forced resignation as president of the National Defense University and ended his military career.

Bipolar General offers a candid account of Martin's personal journey with undiagnosed mental illness as he rose through the ranks of the U.S. Army. The author provides a first-hand look at the various treatments available for bipolar disorder ranging from powerful medications to electroconvulsive therapy. He discusses why his condition went undiagnosed for so long and explores what can be done both within and outside the armed forces to diagnose and treat mental illness. Bipolar General should be of value to those with mental illness and to the communities of family, friends, and caregivers surrounding them. Drum therapy is an ancient approach that uses rhythm to promote healing and self-expression. Therapeutic rhythm techniques have been


